 - pure comparative fault
 - traditional landowner rules
 - California rules on negligent infliction of emotional distress, products liability, and negligence per se. Where not specified, if there is more than one rule you should tell me both/all.

BE CAREFUL TO ALLOW ADEQUATE TIME TO READ CAREFULLY AND ANALYZE THE QUESTIONS, TO THINK, AND TO PLAN AND ORGANIZE YOUR ANSWERS. I have left a half hour for reading/outlining and review. Please do write in complete sentences, and pay attention to writing mechanics like spelling and grammar.

Your discussion of your reasons is more important than your conclusions. Be sure to consider the facts carefully, and to use them when needed. You should not need any additional facts in your analysis. If you find ambiguities or make assumptions, be sure and tell me what they are. I will use the assumptions you made to understand your answer. Answer the questions I ask, not those you think I should have asked. If I ask you about a suit against a particular person, don't tell me about other potential suits, even if you think they would be successful.
