



Madeleine Bernhardt is an adjunct professor at the Berlin School of Economics and Law in Germany where she teaches psychology of communication and emotion to law enforcement officers. At CENTRAL she regularly organized international Summer Academies on Mediation and Business Negotiation as well as on International Commercial Arbitration, and developed and taught soft skill training courses for law students and lawyers.

Madeleine has six years of experience working with judges and prosecutors on emotions in the court hearing, the psychology of witness examination, rhetoric and influences on legal decision-making processes and published articles about the importance of emotional and social competencies for lawyers. Madeleine studied law and psychology in Cologne, Berlin and Paris. During her time at CENTRAL she finished her doctoral studies where she explored the interdisciplinary understanding between judges and psychological expert witnesses in the criminal main hearing.
