## Course Description CGRS Refugee Rights Clinic

This is a new component to the existing Immigrant Rights Clinic which will provide students with a unique opportunity to work on a range of skills relevant to human rights, immigration and refugee law. Students will work approximately 16-20 hours per week on assignments involving refugee law and policy, which is at the heart of the work carried out by the law school's Center for Gender and Refugee Studies (CGRS). In order to get a better understanding of the work of CGRS, you are encouraged to consult the following website: [cgrs.uchastings.edu](http://cgrs.uchastings.edu).

Student participation in CGRS is different than in most legal settings, to the extent that the overall goal is to involve the students in as much of the work of the Center as possible. Students will be given as much individual responsibility as feasible, with one-on-one supervision, so as to provide them with mentoring and the opportunity to develop important professional skills and values. Students will work under the direct supervision of CGRS attorneys, and will also participate in a 2-unit seminar, which will meet on Mondays from 1:40-3:30, in room 219, and will be attended by all students in the Immigrants Rights Clinic. In the seminar, which will meet once a week, students will discuss cases, and further develop skills relevant to the work in which they are engaged in their clinical experience. Some of the topics which will be covered are legal ethics, interviewing and counseling, and advocacy in non-traditional forums.

The CGRS Refugee Rights Clinic will be of particular interest to students who are interested in exploring how successful advocacy on individual cases can impact the development of the law, and how "non-legal" strategies, such as media and grassroots mobilization, can strengthen traditional legal strategies.

**Credit allocation:** 2-unit seminar, 4-unit clinical component, for a total of 6 units.

**Requirements:** Immigration and/or Refugee Law are strongly preferred but not required. Approval of applications will be made by instructors.

**Applications:** Those who have already applied to the Immigrants Rights clinic should indicate whether they would like to apply to CGRS Refugee Rights portion of the clinic. Please submit a statement of interest and a resume reflecting your background, indicating any foreign language abilities. Quick notes about computer exams:

-- Everyone must install the latest version of SofTest (version 8.0) to take computer exams (this includes students who had SofTest installed last semester).

-- You can download/install the software NOW -- it's better to do so earlier than later.

-- We will offer "wireless" for all computer exams so students do not need floppy disk drives. However, make sure your computer works on the Hastings wireless network

-- Students who have floppy disk drives can still use floppy disks for their exams. The "wireless" option is NOT mandatory.

-- We will have one more installation session to help students download and install SofTest (Nov. 30, 3:40-4:30, Rm K).

-- Students who are eligible and want to take the "Internet Take-Home" exams must attend a mandatory information session (even for those students who participated in Internet Take-Home exams last semester). See the online information for details.

## Student Health

**The Insurance and Rx cards have arrived!!!** Please stop by Student Health Services at your earliest convenience to sign for and pick up your cards. Please bring your school I.D.

NOTE: All incoming students must provide mandatory health documents to Student Health Services. Most students have already fulfilled this requirement, however there are a number of students who have either neglected to turn in any documentation or have not provided all the mandatory pieces of the required paperwork to Health Services. Students who are lacking have been SIC-dropped a reminder about what is owed. Also, the information about health documents being received or what is missing can be found through accessing WebAdvisor. On October 5, 2005, a hold was placed on the records of students still missing health information. **This hold will affect the student during final exam preparation and registering for next semester classes.** Please see Student Health Services immediately if you are missing this information.

### CA BAR NEWS IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR FIRST-YEAR STUDENTS

For those of you who plan to take the California Bar exam following graduation, please be advised that you must register with the State Bar of California within 90 days of beginning your law studies. This means you **must register NO LATER than NOVEMBER 15TH**. You may register online at <http://calbar.xap.com>.

If you are not sure whether you plan to take the California Bar exam following graduation, you may do one of two things:

1) register now in the event that you do decide to take the California Bar, or

2) wait and register prior to taking the exam and pay the late fee.

### EXAMS

Exam Schedule and Exam numbers  
The finalized Fall 2005 exam schedule is posted in the Records Office and on the Records website.

Please remember to pick up your Fall 2005 exam number from the Records Office before your first exam.

### RESCHEDULING EXAMS

Hastings Academic Regulations allow you to delay an examination if you have two exams at the same time or if you are scheduled to sit for an exam that begins within 24 hours of the end of another of your exams (or 30 hours if the examined units total 7 or more). If you have such a conflict, the Records Office automatically rescheduled your exam, informing you of the new date by placing a message in your SIC folder.

If you wish to reschedule an exam outside these rescheduling guidelines or for reasons other than a conflict between two exams (for example, a health problem, accident, personal emergency, or some other extraordinary circumstance), you may submit an Exam Reschedule Petition to the Records Office for review by the Academic Dean. These petitions are available in the Records Office. You will be asked to provide documentation with your petition. Responses will be SIC-dropped, usually within a week.

Please take some time to look over the schedule and begin planning your upcoming semester. ## CAREER TIPS

### A Key to Researching Employers by Pam Hyland

Career Services counselors say, “Be sure to research the employers!” but you may wonder how and what information to seek. Students say, “They look the same on their websites!” True, but with digging, you can analyze resources for a clearer picture that will make your Self-Directed Job Search more targeted and, therefore, more productive.

**The organization’s website** gives you an idea of how the organization presents itself, of what they are proud, and what services they offer. Digging deeper, you find their list of representative clients; are those clients you’d enjoy supporting? Do you have an expertise in addition to your legal training that those clients might value? Read the biographies of the attorneys for some ideas about their practice and interview ice-breaking material.

**Hastings faculty members** are well networked into the legal community and are knowledgeable about organizations in their fields of expertise. Drop by their office hours with a list of potential employers and ask them for their impressions.

**Contacts within the organization** are invaluable resources about the “culture”. If you know someone who works there, great! If not, get a list of attorneys practicing there from your college alumni association or, even better, from the Hastings Alumni Relations office. Call the alumni, introduce yourself, and ask for their assessment of the culture and atmosphere of the organization, the outlook for financial stability, the

working conditions, etc. While you must be diplomatic in the wording of the questions, you can still gain valuable “inside information”.

**Attorneys you meet at Bar Association or on-campus panels** are experienced voices who know the well-respected firms. If you haven’t joined your local Bar Association (rather than the wider-known ABA), you’re missing a chance to ask practicing attorneys about employers.

**Hastings students** are a marvelous resource for you! In the CSO you will find candid, confidential assessments of a wide variety of organizations from students who have gone before you. In addition to their written comments, many students include their email addresses or phone numbers so you can ask specific questions. Don’t miss this wonderful cache of collected wisdom, organized into binders for easy reference.

**Lexis-Nexis** and other online information resources are quick and easy ways to find articles about firms and organizations, and the attorneys who work there. Look in the legal news section to find relevant articles.

**The Legal Press**, such as the Daily Journal and the Recorder, are filled with interesting stories about what’s happening at firms and dynamic attorneys who are doing groundbreaking work. Check them out for additional information.
